TV Watching is Bad for Babies' Brains

Babies who watch TV are more likely to have delayed cognitive development and language at 14 months, especially if they're watching programs intended for adults and older children.

Babies who watched 60 minutes of TV daily had developmental scores one-third lower at 14 months than babies who weren't watching that much TV. Though their developmental scores were still in the normal range, the discrepancy may be due to the fact that when kids and parents are watching TV, they're missing out on talking, playing, and interactions that are essential to learning and development.

This new study, which appeared in the *Archives of Pediatric and Adolescent Medicine*, followed 259 lower-income families in New York, most of whom spoke Spanish as their primary language at home. Other studies examining higher-income families have also come to the same conclusion: TV watching not only isn't educational, but it seems to stunt babies' development.



But what about "good" TV, like Sesame Street? The researchers didn't find any pluses or minuses when compared to non-educational programs designed for small children, like SpongeBob SquarePants. Earlier research by some of the same scientists, most of whom are at New York University School of Medicine-Bellevue Hospital Center, has found that parents whose children watch non-educational TV programs like Spongebob SquarePants spend less time reading to their children or teaching them.

The bottom line: This latest study adds more fuel to a recommendation from the American Academy of Pediatrics that babies under age 2 watch no TV at all.

CHARTER COUNCIL NEWS

Hello YRCS Families:

CC, along with a group of parent and teacher volunteers, has been busy supporting the effort to develop a Strategic Plan for our community. The document will formalize our goals for the next 3-5 years and is intended to be a living document that can be monitored and updated over the years. It will give us concrete projects to showcase when we look for grants and donations, and hopefully keep us all focused as we move YRCS into its next phase of growth. Thanks to all for completing the survey that is being used as a foundation in this process.

CC has also been monitoring the situation with Little Creek, our on-site preschool program. After a wonderful start to the year, the program was abruptly brought up short in late November due to a serious flood in the basement. Administration has been working with Marguerite Vulfs to develop alternate plans. Repairs are being coordinated through our landlord, and after lots of discussions and evaluations, it was determined that the best solution was to change the program to two days a week from its original three, so that Sweet Pea Kindergarten and Little Creek could share space. Negotiations and long term planning for the future of this program are underway, with the stated goal to return it to a 3 day a week program by next year.

New members Robert Wallis and Mariana Nielsen were welcomed this month. Robert will take over the duties of Parent Council Rep, acting as liaison between the two groups. Mariana will take on the role of Secretary, including these monthly updates in the newsletter. We are still evaluating the responsibilities of the newly created position of Treasurer and will look to fill this role in the near future. If you know of anyone outside our school community that has specific skills in finance, please see Susan Egan to discuss. The CC has been hearing results of teacher evaluations, acting as oversight for the school community, and will perform the evaluation of the director over the next couple of months.

Progress continues towards the development of our new campus. The big recent push was to satisfy all the state's requirements for paperwork. This has all been submitted (Go, Susan Egan!) and once the state approves it, we will receive our initial \$1.5 million. In the meanwhile, work continues on acquiring and formally evaluating an appropriate site. Robert Wallis, licensed architect, has joined the building committee, along with Caleb Buckley, Susan Egan, and Vitskaia Fernandez who acts as Project Manager. The goal, if all goes well, is to move into the new school facility for the school year 2013/2014.

Please join us in congratulating Mr. Buckley on being selected as president of the National Alliance for Waldorf Charter Schools and giving the keynote address at its recent annual conference. YRCS is a founding member and role model for this ever expanding group. We are very proud of our school for its achievements at this national level. Carrie Reuther, second grade teacher, also presented a talk on the Virtues Project at the conference.

The annual fund drive will be kicking off soon. Look for more information in upcoming newsletters and phone calls. The sooner you get your pledge card in, the less phone calls you will receive. \bigcirc
